

## ¿Quién Puede Votar en las Elecciones Federales de Los Estados Unidos?

### Para Votar en las Elecciones Federales:

- Debes ser ciudadano de Los Estados Unidos
  - A través de Nacimiento en los Estados Unidos
  - A través de Nacimiento en el extranjero de un Padre Ciudadano de Los Estados Unidos
  - A través de naturalización.
- Reunir los requisitos residenciales de tu Estado.
- Debes tener al menos 18 años para el día de las elecciones.
- Puede ser te que puedas registrar antes de las elecciones si cumplirás 18 años en el día de las elecciones; revisas tus requisitos estatales aquí:

### **¡Antes de votar-asegúrate que seas elegible!**

Si votas en una elección sin permiso o dices ser ciudadano de Estados Unidos para votar, estas rompiendo la ley federal y pudieras enfrentar multas y tiempo en cárcel. Eso también podría prevenirte de convertirte en residente legal and podría llevarte a la deportación. Aunque te hayas erróneamente registrado para votar, así cuando estas renovando tu licencia, no puedes legamente votar al menos que reúnas los requisitos necesarios. Si no estás seguro (a) a cerca de tu elegibilidad, es importante llamar para hablar con uno de nuestros abogados de inmigración al 704-334-0004.

# Who Can Vote in the U.S. Presidential Election?

Voting in the United States is one of the most important ways Americans can participate in our democracy.



## Before you vote – make sure you are eligible!

If you vote in an election without permission or claim to be a U.S. citizen to vote, you're breaking federal law and could face fines or jail time. It might also hurt your chances for certain immigration benefits and could lead to deportation. Even if you were mistakenly registered to vote, like when renewing your driver's license, you can't legally vote unless you meet the necessary requirements. If you're unsure about your eligibility, it's important to ask your immigration lawyer.

### To Vote in U.S. Federal Elections, You Must:

- Be a U.S. citizen
  - Through birth in the United States<sup>1</sup>
  - Through birth overseas to a U.S. citizen parent
  - Through naturalization<sup>2</sup>
- Meet your state's residency requirements
- You must be at least 18 years old by election day.
  - You may be able to register before the election if you will be 18 years old on election day; check your state's requirements here: <https://www.usa.gov/voter-registration-age-requirements>.
- Register to vote by your state's deadline

### Some States Have Rules That Limit Who Can Vote Based On:

- Felony convictions
- Mental incapacity

If you have questions about whether you may vote in your state, contact the election officials in the jurisdiction (usually the county) where you wish to register and vote.

### Ways to Vote:

- Vote in person at your designated polling place on Election Day

- Vote early in person at your designated early polling place
- Request a mail-in/ absentee ballot if available and vote by mail

### Donating or Volunteering for a Political Campaign:

U.S. citizens and lawful permanent residents, including those living abroad, may contribute money to and volunteer with federal political campaigns. For more information see: <https://www.fec.gov/help-candidates-and-committees/foreign-nationals/>

Foreign nationals, including DACA, TPS, and nonimmigrant visas holders cannot give money to political campaigns. They may, however, provide volunteer (unpaid) services to political campaigns, so long as they are not in a decision-making role.

<sup>1</sup>Some examples of proof of your citizenship are U.S. passports, U.S. birth certificates, and U.S. naturalization certificates.

<sup>2</sup>Lawful permanent residents cannot vote in federal elections, though they may be able to vote in certain local elections.
